What Jung saw in Christianity was its potential for the concept of God to evolve. In the Book of Job, God is played against Himself. Christianity, following Judaism, proposes a "metamorphosis in the divine", and also a terminal paradox – the serpent, the source of evil, offers humankind "increased conscious knowledge".

" I think that one of the greatest barriers to a dialogue between Jungian thought and Christianity lies in Jung's attacks on the view of God as all-good, put forth in his controversial treatise "Antwort auf Hiob" (1952).

Jungian analysts typically believe that the psyche is the source of healing and the drive toward individuation. Western religious tradition, Jung's assessment of Western religion arose both from his own experiences as well as from the psychotherapeutic work with his European clients.
